WINDWARD PASSAGE

Introducing friends and family to Unitarian Universalism

I've been a UU for several decades and during that time I often hear people suggest that "we shouldn't proselytize like other religions do. That it isn't right for a 'free thinking' religion to do so." I could not disagree more.

Often times when I talk to another person who asks me about Unitarian Universalism and I explain our principles and purposes and where our beliefs come from, I am greeted with the same expression – "Well that is what I believe too." In so many cases there are people who would greatly benefit from joining a UU congregation, but they don't know anything about Unitarian Universalism, and they don't know we exist. This is because we do a very poor job at "marketing." Marketing 101 in business schools teaches that in order to sell a product you have to tell people about it. Perhaps the idea of "selling Unitarian Universalism" to others sounds objectionable, but I have another rationale.

Americans, particularly young people, are leaving mainstream religions in huge numbers. These people simply cannot relate to the doctrines and beliefs of these religions. In so many cases, this is leaving a "spiritual void space" in people's lives.

As the most liberal, open, and inclusive religion in America, we can offer a new spiritual home to these people, but they need to know who we are and that we exist. As people dedicated to helping others, I think it is incumbent on us to do so, and I think the UUA should focus on this too – much more than they do these days.

So – don't be shy about telling people who we are and what we can do for them. And – please bring people to UUMH to check us out!


