A young lady named Mercelia Evelyn, daughter of the legendary Levi Eldridge Jr., originally opened a library on her father's wharf at the end of Deep Hole Road in Harwich. Over the years, the library grew and moved down Main Street to Levi's store (currently 2607 Main) and eventually to its current location in 1934. October 19 Knowledge is a Key to Spiritual Searching Rev. Chris McMahon

It's unfortunate that many if not most adults stop learning about the world around them when they leave high school or college. Lack of learning can, most often, lead to a closed mind. A closed mind prevents a person from seeking and finding spiritual truth.

October 26 The Everyday Prayers of Process Philosophy Rev. Barbara Whittaker-Johns

Perhaps, as Unitarian Universalists, we might claim for ourselves the power of everyday prayer as a *relational* activity that creates new life. A process world-view invites us to imagine that such prayer might create new life whether that's within each of us, between us, in distant places of suffering or turmoil; whether for our numbered days on Earth, or in the timeless realm beyond birth and death.



WINDWARD PASSAGE

"It is a Small World – Particularly for Some"

When we meet someone we know in an unexpected place, or when we find out we share a common friend with a stranger, we usually say – "Oh what a small world." In many ways it is it is a small world, but this is not what I mean by this saying.

Instead – I find that for many people, their world is very small. In other words, although most Americans are presented with endless opportunities to learn, to explore, to challenge one's beliefs, a lot of people simply do not do this.

Sometimes it is appalling what seemingly educated people do not know. I remember when the late night host, Jay Leno, used to take advantage of this in his segments on "Jay Walking." One of his common vignettes was to interview people on the streets of New York and ask questions such as "Who was Columbus? or "Where is Libya?" Incredibly, a great number of people could not/cannot answer the most basic of questions.

From a religious and spiritual standpoint, this is distressing, and it is dangerous, because it can easily lead to an unwillingness to grow intellectually and spiritually. In turn this can lead to bigotry and intolerance. Sadly, some people – even whole nations use religion as a justification for heinous acts even though the religion they seemingly practice in no way justifies their actions toward others. We find examples of this in many nations and religions throughout the world and in today's "ISIS phenomenon."

Unitarian Universalists can be proud that our tradition calls for a responsible search for truth and meaning, and it draws wisdom from all the world's religion. We are an open people, or at least we strive to be.

That said – it is all too easy, even for UU's, to become intolerant of others who do not share our views. It is important to realize that practicing openness and acceptance of others and continually expanding our knowledge as we pursue our spiritual quest is a lifelong process. We do not "graduate" one day with all the answers for there are always many more questions.

How much time do you devote to continually learning and trying to spiritually grow?

UPDATE AND EXPLANATION FROM THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES

The recent decision to pause frequent rallies on the UUMH lawn was not made lightly. Many of our members sympathize with the mission of the "What Now" group, and you will see individuals from our community standing with them. However, it's important to clarify that "What Now" is not a UUMH-sponsored organization, and some members have expressed discomfort with ongoing protest activity on our lawn.

UUMH is, first and foremost, a religious and spiritual community. While we remain committed to social justice and are open to hosting occasional standouts that align with our values, frequent rallies on our property can send the wrong message. They may give the impression that UUMH is politically affiliated or aligned with only one viewpoint. This could unintentionally alienate potential members and hinder our ongoing efforts to grow as an inclusive, welcoming congregation.


Unfortunately, miscommunication and misunderstanding have played a role in recent events. The previous Board of Trustees (BOT) approved the June 14 "No Kings" event, which the "What Now" group interpreted as an approval for future rallies. The July "Good Trouble" rally occurred before the new BOT held its first meeting. Then, last Thursday, the BOT received late notice of two more upcoming protests—highlighting a second instance of miscommunication.

Considering these issues, the BOT has decided to be more selective about activities held on our lawn. Like other towns on Cape Cod, there are public spaces better suited for protests—venues that are accessible, safe, and welcoming to all. That said, we are pleased to share that the BOT and "What Now" have mutually agreed: The October 18 "No Kings 2" rally, a national event, will be held on the UUMH lawn

After that, the group will seek a new location for future gatherings.

We thank everyone for their understanding as we navigate this with care and compassion for all voices in our community.

Our gatherings aim to hear and support each other along with the vulnerable in our communities in this starkly altered world we share. The second meeting of the month is still to be determined. ALERT ALERT ALERT ALERT

Members and Friends,

I was distressed to learn in late July that someone had sent out an email with my picture on it requesting "help" in the form of sending gift cards. Sadly, this type of scam is becoming more and more common, and it is difficult to guard against it – particularly with the advent of artificial intelligence.

I have one piece of advice. If you receive a telephone call, a fax or an email requesting some action from you that involves asking for any of your personal information, or if there is a request for anything that involves money or finances – DO NOT – respond immediately. Call a verifiable and trusted telephone number first and inquire if the information requested is legitimate.

Example – if someone calls you asking for information, tell them you will call back and use only a telephone number you know is trustworthy and accurate. Don't let them try to talk you into giving them information over the phone until you have checked it out.

Example – if you receive a fax or email requesting information – DO NOT immediately respond. Call a telephone number that you know is trustworthy and ask if it is a legitimate email or fax.

And remember – the federal government: Social Security, Medicare, the Internal Revenue Service – WILL NEVER send you an email or text and will never call you. They will only communicate with you by old-fashioned mail!

And – if you are doubtful, call a friend or you can even send me an email and I'll call you to discuss!

It is so sad we must be so careful these days, but it is a reality.
