There is a chill in the air as I sit to write this morning, a harbinger of the season to come! It is bright and crisp and once bundled up, a joy to experience. And while there is a chill in the air, our hearts are filled with the warmth of the season. When I was young and phasing out of a belief in an actual Santa Claus who made his way down the chimney with a bag of toys, I refused to give up on the idea of Saint Nick, believing instead that he stood for the Spirit of Giving in our lives and world. Clearly one of those moments when my father's retort that I was 'too deep for my own good' held sway, but I still hold onto this notion today. Our Soul Matters theme this month is "Wonder." I will be devoting our December 11th service to this topic, and I wonder . . . Something in the natural world, something in your relationships, something about where your thoughts wander. I invite you to reflect on this idea and to share what you discover with me sometime before the 8th of the month.

Our Advent Reflections continue through the 18th and you are invited to join in whether you can attend them all or just one. Together we engage in a time of sharing, an opportunity to deepen our relationships with one another, to give and receive from our hearts. The warmth and intention of the season are alive again in our midst. Check the e-blast and watch for weekly invitations in your email.

Our world is offering us so many opportunities to enter into a mindset of giving. While we would rather this was not the case, the truth is that there will always be need in our lives. There is no gift too small, none is insignificant. When we operate from a place of gratitude and generosity, the spirit of the season is amplified, and like the Grinch, our hearts grow and grow, love overflowing and poured out. May you find in this month of holidays and holy days the Spirit of Giving in your interactions with one another, with family and friends, with those whose need is greater than our own. In so doing, may you be blessed and blessing both.
