WINDWARD PASSAGE

"Making a Small Footprint"

One of the things that bothers me a lot is when I see someone carelessly throw a bottle or trash out of their car. We have all seen someone doing this, possibly many times. It certainly says something about the person.

What a sense of entitlement. What a lack of care and compassion for other human beings and the sacred world in which we live. Sadly, there are all too many people who do these types of things, and of course, there are those who perpetrate horrendous environmental deeds in the endless pursuit of wealth and sometimes power.

I have been blessed to have traveled all over the world and wherever there is a concentration of human beings, there is often litter and pollution. In most cases, people have little or no regard for the environment around them. Sometimes poverty is offered as an excuse for those who blatantly throw garbage anywhere they wish to. But poverty is not an excuse. People that pollute the world around them are ignorant and often insensitive and they lack a sense of the sacred. I have visited a lot of poor cities and towns that are clean and neat.

The real problem with people who do not care about the environment around them is they just do not have a sense of what their actions do to the world nor do they care. This is not new. Frankly, throughout human history, most civilizations have cared little about the environment. Historically this really didn't matter because there were just not many human beings and the world was a big place. People thought the world was endless and their pollution mattered little or not at all. For most of the years I sailed around the world on merchant ships, we threw our trash over the side every day. What did it matter? The oceans of the world were huge. Now we know otherwise because the oceans are full of garbage. Ships no longer do this.

With nearly 7 billion human beings on earth, our litter and our pollution matters a lot! Perhaps the best example of this is China. Today, the pollution problem in China is a full-blown crisis. It is so bad that the average life span of the Chinese has dropped five years in the last twenty. 10% of the farmland in China is polluted with toxins and unfit to farm and the problems are getting worse with each passing year. A good portion of the ground water in China is polluted and unusable.

The good news is that each one of us can make a difference – really a dramatic difference in the way we live our life. We can be careful about the cars we drive and the products we use. We can recycle every possible thing we can. We can make our homes more environmentally friendly by using energy-saving devices. We can adjust our lifestyle to minimize our impact on the environment around us. Everything we do in this regard is a sacred act. It is an act of respect and an act of thanks.

When we practice how to make a small footprint in the world, we show love for others and for the earth, and we engage the interconnected and interdependent web of existence of which we are a part.

THRIFT SHOP



ALERT ALERT ALERT ALERT

Members and Friends,

I was distressed to learn in late July that someone had sent out an email with my picture on it requesting "help" in the form of sending gift cards. Sadly, this type of scam is becoming more and more common, and it is difficult to guard against it – particularly with the advent of artificial intelligence.

I have one piece of advice. If you receive a telephone call, a fax or an email requesting some action from you that involves asking for any of your personal information, or if there is a request for anything that involves money or finances – DO NOT – respond immediately. Call a verifiable and trusted telephone number first and inquire if the information requested is legitimate.

Example – if someone calls you asking for information, tell them you will call back and use only a telephone number you know is trustworthy and accurate. Don't let them try to talk you into giving them information over the phone until you have checked it out.

Example – if you receive a fax or email requesting information – DO NOT immediately respond. Call a telephone number that you know is trustworthy and ask if it is a legitimate email or fax.

And remember – the federal government: Social Security, Medicare, the Internal Revenue Service – WILL NEVER send you an email or text and will never call you. They will only communicate with you by old-fashioned mail!

And – if you are doubtful, call a friend or you can even send me an email and I'll call you to discuss!

It is so sad we must be so careful these days, but it is a reality.
