BOILER REPLACEMENT MEETING

The Meeting House has two gas-fired boilers in the attic that feed a recirculating hot water system which provides heat to the entire building. These boilers are twelve years old and are near the end of their life. In addition to corroding aluminum heat exchangers, the electronic control systems are now unreliable, resulting in a building that is too cold or too warm. Three vendors and the manufacturer do not recommend attempting to repair the existing boilers. Two replacement boilers with stainless steel heat exchangers will cost us about \$25,000. The money for the replacement boilers can come from our Reserve Fund.

There will be a special meeting following the service on May 8 to approve the purchase of new boilers. During the meeting, I will explain why the boilers should be replaced, why gas-fired boilers are a better option than electric heat pumps, and the financing of this project.

It has helped with the cost of a Memorial Service collation or even the rental of a space for such a collation when the Thrift Shop is in residence! Special small financial assistance on a personal basis may also be approved by the committee. Other expenditures are certainly possible and are dependent upon Pastoral Care Team approval.




