REPORT FROM THE SEARCH COMMITTEE

What's going on with the Search committee? When we wish Rev. Tracy farewell in June, we hope to have a new part-time minister in place for our Meeting House. How is that done? The Unitarian Universalist Association maintains an online portal through which candidate ministers can make known their interest in an opening like ours. That process is now underway. The Search Committee is receiving applications from candidates interested in serving as our part time minister starting in July 2024.

After careful consideration, including reviewing a candidate's online responses to a series of questions, conducting interviews, contacting references, and consulting with UUA staff, the Search committee will make a recommendation to the Board of Directors of UUMH. The Board makes the final decision and will approve the contract with the minister.

The names of potential candidates are not disclosed beyond the committee. Ministers expect this from search teams, and it is part of their covenant of fair process with the UUA. So, while at times congregations may not see much going on with the Search, there is a lot of work, research, and discussion happening quietly in order to bring a successful candidate forward for UUMH. The confidential nature of the process means that members of the Search committee cannot discuss individual candidates outside of the committee.

The Search Committee hopes to have a recommendation for the Board in early spring 2024. We have been well served by Rev. Tracy as our Minister. As she moves on in June to the opportunities that lie ahead, we wish her all the best. Meanwhile, we hope to have a new minister in place this summer. Please feel free to reach out to any of the committee members if you have any questions about this process.

This month I plan to begin a four-month study with those of you interested in exploring the underlying values in the proposed UUA Article II Bylaw language that is under study this year across the UUA. We will be using the UU Wellspring Small Group model for this process which lends itself to deepening one's own understanding while coming to know other participants more fully. I will send out further details to registrants as the date grows closer.

Our theme this month is "Liberating Love." It is the kind of love that the Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King was referencing when he talked about Beloved Community. Together we will explore what liberating love means and what it asks of us. We will take a dive into Latin American liberation theology and Catholic social teaching. What can they teach us as we strive to make King's goal a reality in our world? And what does it mean when Unitarian Universalists use the expression "Side with Love?" Love is centered in the graphic depicting the Article II values and we call it the Spirit of this place. How central is it in our lives together and in our way in the wider world?

As we settle into to the calm and quiet of a Cape Cod winter, I invite you take some time to think about where love shows up in your life – with family, in community connections, through an acknowledgement for our abundance, in its being shared. You will have your own places, no doubt! As we weather the season, may our hearts be warmed and full, and may we know the power of love in our midst.


SOCIAL JUSTICE

SCOUT SCUTTLEBUTT

Troop 71 had a very successful, damp, and windy camping outing on **Monomoy Island**. Our own Luka Eldredge was recognized for his tent erection and sustainability. His was the only tent to survive a very windy night...it was still standing in the morning!

Plans are just about complete for a **ski weekend** at Gunstock Ski resort for the first weekend in February. There are also plans in the works for a **winter camp** experience to be held sometime this winter, date to be determined.
