# **December 31 NO SERVICE**



Dear Ones, All -

Happy Holidays! Happy Holidays! This song keeps playing in my head as I sit to write this morning! I find myself wanting to balance the sadness I am experiencing in the midst of so much brokenness with the joy I have come to associate with this season. I hope you are able to do the same. Hope is certainly something we need right now. The ability to believe that something good or better is possible, in the offing, on its way for us and all of humanity. All of our various traditions point to this as the darkness expands over more and more of our days until that moment when it suddenly reverses itself and begins the cycle toward light. It doesn't affect us as much as it might have those who lived centuries ago, but we still feel it in our bones.

One of my favorite traditions associated with this season is bringing in the greens to create and light an Advent wreath. We have done this together over the past few years. The first week focuses on hope for what is to come. As Unitarians this is not often a hope in the birth of the Messiah, but that doesn't mean we can't consider what we are hoping for in our personal lives and our life together here at the Meeting House. Week two looks at peace and as we grapple with the violence around us, we need to think about ways to incorporate peacefulness into our days. Week three is about joy. Whatever it is for you, may joy be alive in your heart. The fourth week is the week of love. This is the bottom line for me! There is a greater love, a mysterious presence that holds and heals, accompanies me on the journey. What does love mean to you?

Our services this month will be a little different and I hope you find them meaningful. We will have a shared service on December 3<sup>rd</sup> with leaders of our Small Group Ministry. On December 10<sup>th</sup> we will explore the gift of mystery, our theme for the month. I will be offering a special "Blue Christmas" service on December 17<sup>th</sup>. For many of us this is a hard time of the year emotionally and spiritually. We will join together in a service of poetry and special music with a ritual opportunity to name our griefs and losses, be they personal or more broadly focused. On Christmas Eve we will have our traditional Candlelight Service of Lessons and Carols. **Please note the earlier time – 4:00 p.m.** We will not gather on the morning of the 24<sup>th</sup>.

However you celebrate this month, whether it is a family tradition or a religious observance passed down through the generations, or through rituals you have created yourself which express your personal theology, may it be a time filled with awe and meaning. As we gather in community, may you find hope for the days to come, peace in your heart, joy in your step, and an all-embracing love surrounding you.

#### SOCIAL JUSTICE COMMITTEE

At the November meeting of the Social Justice Committee Rev Tracy reported the there was a small but interesting discussion of the Common Read book, On Repentance and Repair. This may be a topic for a future sermon.

Everyone felt that the information shared by Sheriff Donna Buckley was informative and worthwhile.

As members finish up the donations for the Homeless Shelter, the Community Outreach for December will be Independence House, Cape Cod's leading resource, counseling and advocacy center to address and prevent domestic and sexual violence.

Rev. Tracy and Joan Caputo reported on upcoming events sponsored by the Nauset Interfaith Association. They have recently concluded a series on Voices of Refugees. The MLK Action Team will be working with local bookstores to encourage folks to purchase books at about a 3rd grade level featuring peoples of color. The MLK Breakfast will take place at the Church of the Holy Spirit in Orleans in January. And they are working on Youth Outreach to homeless, unhoused teens.

Susan Patterson shared info on Climate Action. There was discussion about a possible Sunday service around Climate Change and its effect on the Cape.

#### ENDOWMENT BOARD MESSAGE

Soon the income tax season will be here. You may find it beneficial to use a special tax saving measure that is available for those wishing to make a charitable contribution.

That measure, known as a "Qualified Charitable Distribution" (QCD), allows anyone who takes a distribution from an Individual Retirement Account (IRA) during the year to deduct the amount given. Normally, any distribution from an IRA is taxable to the recipient as ordinary income. If some or all of that distribution is paid directly to a charity by the IRA custodian, that amount will not be subject to any tax. That means the charity (the UUMH, either for a pledge or contributions to the Endowment Fund) benefits fully from the gift, and the donor (you) will have a reduced tax bill.

The Endowment Board cannot properly give anyone tax advice, and individual circumstances may differ, but we wanted to share this information. Anyone interested in knowing more about this or similar opportunities should consult their tax advisor. Arrangements can be made through you financial institution.

#### **IMAGES OF WAR**

Priscilla Smith, Textile Artist, will have her fabric art on display in the Fleck Room for the month of December. Here is her Description of her art and the philosophy behind it.

My art focuses on Social commentary" and "anti-war." My purpose is to provoke thought and emotion; to raise consciousness; and to galvanize change. For many years of my life, I marched for peace and other social causes. But that is not enough. The artist must also create "images" which reflect, in the case of war, its horror and dark side.

It is the description of what war looks like by the French playwright, Jean Giradoux, in his play Tiger at the Gates; "like the bottom of a baboon....when the baboon is up in a tress, with its hind end facing us; scarlet, scaly, glazed, framed in a clotted filthy wig." It is the picture of the Vietnamese girl running down a road, her skin shredding from napalm. It is a newspaper's response to a reader who asked "....is it true that for every enemy soldier we kill in Vietnam, the United States kills six civilians"". The newspaper replied "....no, no, this is not true. We only kill four civilians for every soldier we kill." These are some of the images which will hopefully galvanize people to say "no more.....no more killing...no more war." In making art about War, I am witnessing to my great respect for the soldiers who are sent off to fight. I do not respect the leaders who make the decisions to go to war...the leaders who unthinkingly assume the conflict is between total good and total evil. The leaders, who through distortions and coercion, move the masses from believing a war is unnecessary to believing in a "just" war.

The processes and materials I use are designed to generate discomfort, sadness, and shock on the part of the viewer. I use images such as crosses with dead soldiers' helmets perched on them; a pastel baby blanket in the shape of an AK47 gun; or burning buildings falling down. I sometimes intentionally use discordant colors. Or I might use beautiful colors to create an awkward juxtaposition with a deadly weapon. I use images such as an array of soldiers' dog tags interspersed with guns and nooses covered with a large hand gun; and a tree with beautiful nests filled with AK47 guns.
