Dear Ones, All -

It is the morning after the announcement of your soon to be minister, the Rev. Christopher McMahon, and the start of the pledge campaign. I said yesterday that I believed us to be at the threshold that we have been preparing for all this time, at the point of crossing over it, all that we have been packed up to carry with us and all that we can be awaiting our thoughtful and rigorous and tenderly loved planning for the future. And we even joined hands, if you missed it, and took a little symbolic step together. You can see it on the website!

It was a bit of an emotional day as we acknowledged out loud once more the fact of our parting and its proximity. A bittersweet kind of knowing because we have used our time together wisely, making the most of what we would have together, its limited tenure a given from the start. You have been open to my (hopefully) gentle honesty about the Meeting House and all that is wrapped up in its ethos. We have navigated new territory, asked hard questions, gotten to know one another, and have come to care deeply for each other. A blessing, to be sure.

Many have asked where I am going! The truth is, not far! I, too, am crossing a threshold. I came to you from community ministry, and to it I will return. Not the same thing in the nonprofit world here on the Cape. Something new. All those roles you see piled up beneath my name on the signature line of my email are calling out to be lived into. Bringing balance to people's lives and beings through my Reiki practice. Accompanying folks as they approach their life's final transition as an End-of-Life Doula. And journeying alongside those who want to explore the place of the Sacred in their days as a Spiritual Companion, this latter one as I complete a 2-year certificate program in Spiritual Direction this month. And there is always pulpit supply and rites of passage! I will be busy, but not so busy that I can't begin to enjoy some of the things which Chuck and I came to the Cape to explore eleven plus years ago. I know you all think of me as your "young minister," but I am not getting any younger, and I have a few things left to do as I make my way toward my 70's!

For now, though, we have three months left to continue to dive into what we've been working on. Structural and organizational revisions are in the offing, and I am so proud of and delighted for you as you navigate changes that will help to make you sustainable – the thing you have said you wanted all along. And this is April! Our theme is interdependence, and boy, aren't we though, in so many ways! I will talk a bit about the water protectors this month, and our 'earthiness' in general as it comes to a close.

May we take the time this month to savor the shifting season, the much-anticipated warmth, the lengthening of days, the buds about to burst open with new life. May we live into newness of life each day that we awaken and know that we are loved.

NEW MINISTER ANNOUNCED


Rev. Christopher McMahon will serve as new minister of UUMH Chatham. The Board of Trustees has hired Rev. Chris McMahon as our new minister. Rev. McMahon will start on July 1, when Rev. Tracy Johnson expects to return to community ministry, with an enhanced focus on the provision of spiritual care and meaningful rites of passage.


A 1977 graduate of the United States Merchant Marine Academy, Rev. McMahon sailed for many years on commercial merchant ships engaged in worldwide trade. He is a master mariner of steam, motor, and sailing vessels. He earned a Masters in Divinity from Starr King School for the Ministry at the Graduate Theological Union in Berkeley, CA in 1993.

Rev. McMahon is also a Rear Admiral in the Maritime Service and served in this capacity in several senior positions with the U. S. Department of Transportation and Maritime Administration. For many years, he also served as a part time minister with several UU congregations on Long Island. In 2021 he retired from the federal government. He also holds Masters' degrees from American University in business and Long Island University in mental health counseling. He is currently an adjunct professor at Nichols College in Dudley MA where he teaches "World Religions" and "Leadership."

Rev. McMahon is eager to return to ministry, he said, "because I feel a strong calling to help people develop their spiritual side and through pastoral counseling to help people deal with the challenges of life." He and his wife, Virginia, reside in Woodstock CT and Brewster MA.

BOY SCOUTS




