Currently, she is working as a Hospice Chaplain. **Rev. Paul Sprecher** served as UUMH's sabbatical minister for six months in 2014 and has spoken here several times a year since. Since his retirement from his seven-year ministry at First Parish in Bridgewater in 2021, he has become a climate activist at his Senior Living Community in Hingham as well as in the town of Hingham.

Dear Ones, All -

There are no words as I sit to write this monthly column, three weeks into October. I know it is my job to come up with words for you - to guide, to comfort, to inform, to spark your minds and hearts. But sometimes there are no words. And the thing we need to do is simply be present to one another. To gather up the courage to be vulnerable with each other. To mourn and grieve the loss of life, the affront to our values, the senselessness of violence as a pathway through difference.

We see these scenes play out before us all the time. This world is no stranger to injustice. It is somehow more heinous this time around and more in our faces, so that we can't ignore it. We are rendered speechless, and I wonder, "Is this what it takes?" to stop us in our tracks, to feel our heart skip a beat, that sudden in-breath, held and then released. How desensitized have we become?

There is a powerlessness that accompanies us in this time of tragedy. And I want to say here that it is okay to not be okay. We care too much to be alright in the midst of so much, so very wrong with how we treat humanity and our precious Earth home. I hope you are taking time to allow some space for all this emotion, to allow yourselves to feel whatever it is that rises to the surface for you. Because the only way through it all is to let yourselves actually experience it as you make your way. There is strength in our coming together, our making time to listen or to just be still, to hold one another in a spiritual sense, but also to reach out and take a hand or give a hug if that is what is needed. It is important to know we are not alone on this journey.

We will come together around the theme of generosity this month and I am drawn to thinking about the many shapes that generosity can take. May we be generous with each other, with the rest of our human family and with our world as we move into the quiet of autumn, the season of gratitude for our kin and our abundant lives, and the preparation of our souls for all that is unfolding before us.


### **COMMON READ**

#### **Ministerial Survey Results**

Thanks to everyone who participated in our recent survey. Here are some of your thoughts about what is important to you in a minister as we look towards hiring a part time minister for when Rev. Tracy moves on in June 2024.

We want a compassionate intellectual, who is approachable, a spiritual leader with a sense of humor who keeps in touch with us and offers new ideas. They should know UU traditions and also understand other faiths. We want a friendly minister with counseling experience and conflict resolution skills who is a good speaker and an equally good listener, and has ideas on increasing membership in UUMH.

And here are your thoughts on what good preaching means to you.

It means a motivating and inspiring speaker and teacher who challenges us with life's big complex issues. They are an intellectual but spiritual guide who can help connect us to the world around us through a variety of topics. They should help us reframe our perceptions and surprise us. They should be reality based, be able to address a wide variety of topics, be relatable and have a sense of humor.

Your favorite parts of the service are the sermon and the music, although "the whole service," Joys and Concerns, Chalice Lighting and meditation were called out as well. Under least favorite part of the service, the most frequent answer was "None." Some specifics mentioned were announcements, doxology, the offertory, coffee hour, meditation, Zoom social hour, readings, the service leader format, applause, and the welcome.

A wide variety of topics was also included under "Other comments/ideas". Key ideas were summarized from the results, and that report is now available to all under the "Members Only" section of the website, www.uumh.net. The results have also been provided to the Board and the Program Council for action as appropriate.

The Search Committee will be sharing these results with candidates for our part time minister to assist in their understanding of what is important to us. Your voice in this process is essential and we are grateful for your support.
