Dear Ones, All -

It has been such a joy to begin to gather again with all of you over the past few months! As more and more of you feel safe to join us in the Meeting House, there is a building sense of hopefulness in our midst. Even if I can't see your smiles, I can see the light dancing in your eyes! And the depth of connection we experience as we share is breathtaking. Navigating this return to something akin to normal in our lives can be tricky, even a little scary. We aren't quite sure how to be with one another in person yet, even as we know how very much we want to do so. We are being gentle with ourselves and compassionate toward each other as we work to create an inclusive community of folks who aren't all ready to be in the same space at the same time or in the same way.

This year has brought so many changes, and this season has been one of transition, not just because we are coming together, but because we are creating new systems – new ways of being as a faith community in post-pandemic times. There are things we will likely never return to, and there are just as many, if not more, things we will put in place to accommodate the new realities of our lives. It is a time of possibility as we envision all that UUMH can be here in Chatham. Change can be awkward for us; uncomfortable, but if we lean into it with love (the Spirit of this place!) and patience (remembering that we abandoned perfection a year and half ago!), I believe we will come through it all shining as brightly as ever, a beacon of faith and justice here on this hill.

So many of our traditions are grounded in hopefulness. Ancient peoples sought that sense of assuredness and trusted in Mystery to deliver it. Whether it was a miracle of oil in their lamps, new life in the promise of a tiny infant, the lengthening of sunlight in their days, a belief in the natural order of things, or the potential end of suffering, all of these point to a deep desire to maintain hope against all odds. Celebrating in this season is about this hopefulness, about keeping an eye toward potential, about what is yet to be. It is a time of deepening introspection and of opening to the light of love in our hearts; being that light for one another.

My hope is that you will join me this month in an opportunity to learn through our Common Read book discussion, in opportunities to reflect together on the four themes of Advent, in gathering for weekly services and a beautiful hybrid Christmas Eve service, all of which you can find out about in this newsletter and in our weekly e-blasts.



CONTACTING KIM CARROLL, OUR BOOKKEEPER

You have several ways to reach Kim Carroll, our bookkeeper, to get bills paid or be reimbursed. Bills are paid once per week, so it is best to plan ahead

Tried and True – fill out a reimbursement sheet in the brochure holder to the right of the office door. Include your name and address, the amount spent, and the committee to which the expense should be charged. Include a sales slip or invoice. Have the committee chair sign the form to approve the charge. Place the completed form in the bookkeeper's mail folder to the left of the office door.

Via email – send an email to Kim at <u>bookkeeperchatham@gmail.com</u> with your name, address, amount spent, and the committee to which the expense should be charged. Scan or photograph the invoice or sales slip. If you are not the committee chair, cc the chair so he/she/they can approve the reimbursement.

"ARTS ON THE WALLS" AT UUMH

Whose art is shown?

Most often, the artists are UUMH members or community artists whose work has been recommended to the Art Committee. We like to encourage new artists. If you notice a budding talent among us, please let us know! What mediums?

We will consider any medium that can be hung by wire on our rod hooks: paintings, textiles, photography, paper, wood, etc. If it doesn't break and can sit on a small table, we will consider that as well.

Does every show have a theme?

Many of them do. Often the artist suggests the theme, but sometimes the Art Committee puts together a show that relates to a subject being talked about. For example, we asked a group of artists to contribute scenes of water (ocean, ponds and rivers) as a fitting backdrop to the Earth Day conversations about cleaning up our Cape Cod waters.

How often are the shows changed?

That depends on the number of artists available who have new work to show.

Is the art for sale?

Some shows are primarily for educational purposes and there are no sales. Most shows provide opportunity for purchasing. Artists agree to donate 15% of sales to the UUMH, but some artists increase the donation.

Viewing times:

Sunday's coffee hour, or by special arrangement with the artist. Some artists schedule a show "Opening" for which they handle invitations, etc. This option has been approved by our Reopening Committee provided that safety protocols- masks and social distancing- are followed. Refreshments will not be served.

Who designs and hangs the shows?

For a one-artist show, the artist usually does the designing. If it is a multi-artists show, the designer is usually someone whose art is not being hung. Designing is hard work because It requires making a piece of art out of many pieces of art! The hanging team has an easier job. They just follow the instructions of the designer, and do the lifting and leveling. What about publicity?

Even our smallest shows will receive the benefit of e-listings on our website, Facebook and other social media that our Communications Coordinator might utilize.
