

Dear Ones, All –

Here we are again at the start of a new year, that moment when we officially move from what was to what will be. We are, of course, doing this all the time, but we mark it with our calendars and make a fresh go of it once every 365 days. It is both a moment like no other and a moment just like all the rest! Maslow says we always have two options: stepping forward in growth or stepping back into safety. Here’s what I want to say about that.

First, stepping back into safety. The year 2021 hasn’t felt so safe for us although we have managed to make it so with our intentionality. Sometimes a step back to take a look at things is a good practice, a balcony view. In those cases, we are doing so in order to prepare ourselves to move forward. Doing nothing is also a step back into safety because we are sticking with the familiar, unexposed to that which might foster growth. It’s a comfortable place that doesn’t require much of us. Vacillation is a choice, a step, and I get it that we may be tired at this point in time in our lives or our journeys or our world. Important though, to acknowledge it and make a conscious decision about it.

Next, stepping forward in growth. What kind of growth are we talking about here? We affirm and promote the encouragement of spiritual growth in our congregations, according to our Principles which guide us on our path. The growth that happens within each of us ultimately serves as a catalyst for the rest of us when take it up in community. It is that creative interchange that I am so fond of! Maybe it feels like stepping forward is leaping off an edge that might be scary or dangerous. If one of us is experiencing this, my guess is that more of us are, too, so we can count on another to serve as parachutes when we do what is risky, but for our own good, as individual persons and as a people.

One of the reasons I am called to parish ministry is that I absolutely love moving with a congregation through periods of uncertainty, risk, and growth. We can work together to create a “safe space” in which to do the work of stepping forward into whatever newness a year or a period of our history may be calling us to. We can spend some time discerning together just what might be asked of us by our hurting world, what a people of a certain faith might bring to the table.

Ours is a unique approach to religion, being covenantal people as opposed to creedal. I hope we can spend some time in the coming months exploring what that meant for our forebears in this tradition and what it might mean for us today. What is the safe container that our faith provides and how can we utilize it to the fullest as we embark on a new year in time?

May your New Year’s celebration be all that you intend for such a time. Mine is a time of reflection and planning, reveling in the beauty of the earth in winter and sharing in the warmth and love of those closest to me. What is it for you?

May we emerge from this turning with fresh eyes to see our way forward into 2022!

SOCIAL JUSTICE COMMITTEE

Following the tragic school shooting by a 15 year old in Michigan we are working on decreasing gun violence. Margaret Tompsett joined the December 14th rally of Grandmothers Against Gun Violence at the Hyannis rotary and has copies of their brochure – “You can save a life now!” which emphasizes the importance of safe gun storage, extreme risk protection orders, and suicide prevention.

The Meeting House has signed on to the Mass. Coalition to Prevent Gun Violence, which has just received money from federal dollars given to Massachusetts. We worry about the school shootings but these are minor compared what communities of color experience every day. 2021 has so far seen the highest number of gun deaths – 42,500 and counting. If you have a friend or know someone with a gun please take one of the brochures from the table outside the Fleck Room. We also need to lobby our legislators for many aspects of gun safety. **GET INVOLVED!**

Thank you to all who completed the Membership committee's quick survey at the end of November. During the November 21 service, we asked members to complete the sentence "I joined UUMH because....." Sixteen people attending in the sanctuary put their responses on an index card provided for that purpose; two attending on Zoom put their responses in the Zoom chat section.

The responses were thoughtful, enlightening, and impressive, and we wanted to share some general thoughts with you. Many members stressed the importance of feeling welcomed into our community. Four members cited the role friends and acquaintances who were already members of the congregation played in getting them to join. Additionally, there is clearly a significant role that sermons, social justice, friendship, support, peaceful discourse, and inclusion play in the whole membership process.

The Membership Committee will be using these results in our Outreach efforts, in social media, and in membership recruitment activities. Many thanks for your help!

A NOTE FROM THE TREASURER

The Meeting House is in good financial condition through the end of November, primarily due to the excellent work of the Thrift Shop volunteers who earned more than \$40,000 for the season. The net amount credited to this fiscal year's income was \$34,000. Plate income is running behind last year. We now expect to receive \$4,000 in plate for the year rather than the budgeted \$8,000. Pledges are coming in slowly, although we expect more at the end of this calendar year and the beginning of the next.

Most expenses are running below budget. We were without paid office staff for the first four months of the fiscal year but are now fully staffed so the monthly expenses have increased. The total cost of the AV system to support hybrid services was \$16,350. \$3,975 has been raised to offset that cost. The Rogers Building Fund has contributed \$8,100 to the project leaving an expense of \$4,244 unbudgeted in this year's accounting. It is likely that we will be able to cover this extra expense due to the Thrift Shop income and lower office expenses during the summer.

I will send out a more formal report at the mid-point of our fiscal year in January. As always, thank you for your support of the Meeting House.


PASTELS ART SHOW BY JANE ECCLES
